Triples league rule change - amendment

In the last newsletter, I mentioned a change to the rules – no trial ends and score 1 on first two ends. Since then, this may have changed again to now having no trial ends, 18 ends straight off.

At the time of writing this, the rules on the HDTL website are still for 2022. Triples league captains to be aware of this before the first game.

Now that the winter series of Dominoes drives has finished, Neil Bedder, the organiser of these nights, has reported that he has raised over £600 through the winter.

As well as organising fun, social evenings, Neil has also boosted the club funds.

Coronation Tournament.

I will hold a fun event on Sunday 7^{th} May – the weekend of the King's Coronation. I have stolen the Bowls England Big Bowls Bash format and adapted it for this event.

This will be a 3,2,1 tournament. 4 sets of 5 ends with a random draw for each set.

I will prepare score cards for each player. Each card will have the rink number for that person to play at each set. These will have been selected at random. The cards will be issued, at random to the players at the start and then each player writes his/her name on the card and then keeps a cumulative score for the rest of the day.

The jack is always set on the T - 6ft from the ditch. The player with the closest wood to the jack scores 3 points, next nearest 2 points and the 3^{rd} nearest 1 point. One point also scored by anyone kissing the jack. All woods in the ditch are dead including touchers. If the jack ends up in the ditch it is respotted on the T. The winner of the end can choose the length of the jack by bringing the mat forward and then bowls first. All bowlers stay at the bowling end until all woods have been delivered.

There will be a maximum of 6 players per rink and they will have 2 woods each. (if only enough players for 4 or less per rink, then the number of woods will change to 3 each)

The format of this game makes it fun for all abilities – the winner of the last end goes first and then has to endure up to 5 others trying to do better. Woods can be knocked up into winning positions, or knocked out of scoring positions – Jacks can move to bring into play outside woods. Everyone has to try and remember whose wood is whose and estimate the closest wood whilst standing at the bowling end.

This is essentially a singles event and the random draw will mean playing against lots of other players, so a great way to socialise. The winner will be the player with the highest score after 20 ends. In the event of a tie, there will be a tie break end, with players only having one wood.

There will be a £2.00 entry fee and all fees will be distributed back as prizes at the end. Free entry to under 16. Open to all Kingscroft members and their guests. Dress code – greys.

I believe the format makes for a fun and quick tournament. Advance booking essential as I have to prepare the random draws. Email me (<u>Eddie newell@mac.com</u>) to reserve your place. I will put a sheet up in the clubhouse.
